Introduction:

The provinces of Ontario, Canada and Jiangsu, Peoples Republic of China are sister provinces that have concluded several educational and cultural agreements. One of these agreements established the Ontario/Jiangsu Student Exchange Program, a provincial student mobility program that started in September 2009.

The program has thirteen participating universities in Jiangsu and ten participating universities in Ontario. The program requires that the number of students moving in both directions must balance over the course of the agreement. However, minor variations in numbers can occur in any given year.

General Requirements:

Exchange students must have completed 2 years of a recognized degree at their home university. While most fields of study in Ontario (subject to restrictions from receiving institutions) will be open for exchange, it must be noted that Ontario medical schools will be exempt from the exchange and it is expected that placements in the province's professional law, business, dentistry, and pharmacology schools will be limited, if at all available. Graduate student exchanges may be limited by individual Ontario universities.

Exchange participants will normally study for up to one academic year as non-degree students. Participating students will pay tuition at their home university and will be exempt from paying tuition at the host university. However, host universities **may** charge certain incidental administrative fees. Jiangsu students will be responsible for their expenses abroad, including travel, room and board, health and accident insurance, miscellaneous incidental expenses that may be required by the host university, and other living expenses. Jiangsu students will be responsible for fees related to the University Health Insurance Plan (UHIP), mandatory for all international students at all Ontario universities with the exception of some institutions, who have their own mandatory health insurance program.

Students are responsible for all aspects — academic, legal, medical, etc. — of their participation in the program. Students must meet the language requirements of the individual Ontario universities, which are outlined below. Students are responsible for arranging any transfer of credits to their home university.

Students are nominated by their home university in Jiangsu based on that institution's selection processes and criteria. Application forms must contain a list of three Ontario universities at which the applicant wishes to study. The Academic Directors will place as many students as possible at their first-choice institution. It is program policy, however, that students be placed equitably throughout the system of participating Ontario universities. The prospective host university is responsible for deciding whether to admit students and at what level (graduate or undergraduate).

Frequently Asked Questions:

1. What does the OJS Exchange offer me?

The OJS exchange offers Jiangsu students the following benefits:

- You do not pay tuition in Ontario; this means that, in effect, you are being offered a scholarship worth between \$10,000 and \$26,000.
- A provincial-wide exchange gives you the opportunity to identify universities with particular academic strengths in your areas of interest.
- The OJS exchange will provide excellent advising and support
- Through liaison with the Canadian Embassy in Beijing we ensure that your visa application is identified as part of the OJS exchange.

2. How can I be sure the program will place me at my first-choice university?

The short answer is: You can't be sure. We will do our best to accommodate your wishes, and we will not place you at a university at which you cannot carry out your proposed program of study. We do reserve the right to place you at a university that you have not requested, in order to ensure equitable distribution of Jiangsu students throughout Ontario. Remember too that each university can accept a limited number of exchange students; sometimes, more students select a university than it can accept. We will ask you first before placing you at a university you have not listed on your application.

You can increase your chances of being placed at your first-choice university by (1) informing yourself thoroughly about each of the Ontario universities and making sure you and your program will "fit" the profile of a prospective university; (2) making clear, in the study plan you enclose with your application, why a particular university is important to you. Please note: Saying that you wish to take particular courses or to study with a particular professor is usually not persuasive. (In any case there is no guarantee, short of an invitation from the professor that she or he will be teaching in a given year.)

The absolute worst way of getting to a particular university is to list only that university on your application form. Applications that do not indicate three possible universities will not be considered (except where fewer than three universities offer your program of study).

3. Do I have to take TOEFL?

It is usually but not always a requirement. Please check the language requirement section of this document for the individual university requirements.

4. Can I earn a degree while in Ontario?

One of the firm principles of the OJS exchange is that students remain degree candidates at their home university, not at their host university. In other words, you cannot earn a degree while on the exchange. If you wish to change from non-degree to degree status, you will have to go through the regular admissions process and pay full tuition fees. You will also cease to be a member of the exchange.

5. How long should I stay in Ontario?

You have a choice of a one- or two-semester exchanges; however, we strongly recommend the two semester exchange as our experience has been that students need this much time to adjust to academic life in Ontario and to benefit fully from their stay in Ontario.

The fall term starts at the beginning of September and lasts into December (with an examination period in December). The winter term starts right after New Year's (January) and goes through late April or early May (depending on examination schedules). In some cases, you may also take summer courses at their host university without paying tuition, but this depends on the individual university.

6. Is it hard to find a place to live in Ontario?

It depends on the city. In Toronto and Ottawa, it is sometimes difficult to find an off-campus (or in some cases, an on-campus) room at an acceptable price. In smaller cities the situation is less difficult. Many Ontario universities will offer residence rooms to OJS students. You should check with the International Office of the prospective host universities.

7. How much will it cost to study in Ontario?

Your university's international office can give you good advice. Some of the things to consider are: (1) you do not have to pay tuition in Ontario, but (2) you do need to purchase health insurance in Ontario (about \$60 per month). (3) You need to figure in your flight, rent, meals, and books (Canadian students generally must buy more books than do Chinese students), as well as telephone, local transit, and entertainment costs. It will probably cost you at least \$1000 (about 5000 CNY) per month, excluding airfare.

8. Can I work or participate in an internship while in Canada?

You may take a job, but only on the campus of your host university. You may also participate in an internship/ practicum, but you will need to arrange both the permission and the position by yourself – this is not part of the OJS exchange.

Proof of English proficiency is required for students whose first language is <u>not</u> English and the primary language of instruction at their home institution is <u>not</u> English

Documents should be **original**, with test dates **no more than 24 months** from the time of application, and should be officially **translated into English.**

<u>NOTE</u>: Undergraduate and graduate students must achieve the **TOTAL** minimum score indicated. They must also achieve the **minimum** score indicated for each **BAND** in Reading, Writing, Speaking and Listening. (there are no exceptions)

 The test report must be in English and the test date cannot be more than 24 months prior to application
- Most recent official transcript <u>translated into English</u> with the Home Institution's <u>Grading System</u>
- In order of priority, a list of **ten** (10) Carleton courses the student would like to be registered in, including course titles and course codes.
- Portfolios must be included for students applying for courses in Architecture, Industrial Design and Interactive Multimedia Design (IMD)

An <u>audition</u> is required for performance courses in Music

Information on your course registration will be emailed to the Carleton email account for undergraduate students from the Registrar's Office. Included in that email will be detailed instructions on how to make registration changes. Language courses: If you have requested a language course and have previous knowledge of that language, you must complete a placement test to confirm your level of proficiency. If it is determined that you have a higher level of proficiency, you will be required to withdraw from the course. Your placement test would be completed in the main office of the School of Linguistics and Language Studies (SLaLS). For information on the testing schedules, please consult the placement testing page available or call +1 (613) 520-6612. Following the test, an email will be sent to your Carleton email account indicating your language placement. At this point you will be able to register in the course level indicated (space permitting). You should attempt to take the placement test as soon as you arrive in Canada as space in language courses is limited. Although testing for Carleton students is expected to be completed prior to the start of classes, testing after classes have started is permitted for exchange students. Testing for the Fall term is not available after the end of the first week of classes. For Winter term language courses, testing will begin again in October and continue until December. English as a Second Language Courses (ESLA Courses): To be eligible to take an ESLA course an official Proficiency Test report (TOEFL,

IELTS, CAEL) is required (no exceptions or substitutes). The test report must be in English and the test date cannot be **more than 24 months prior to application**.

Student Activity Fees & Medical Insurance

UHIP (government health insurance covering basic medical care, approx. \$60/month) + Student Health Plan (covering prescription medication, physical therapy, etc., approx. \$87.50/semester) + Dental Plan (approx. \$118/semester) + Bus Pass (approx. \$157/semester). All student fees are mandatory except for the dental plan for which students may receive a refund for.

Residence

Residence Housing is guaranteed if application is submitted by the deadline. Rates vary (from approx. \$3400 to \$4100 / semester); some residences have a mandatory meal plan. Most exchange students live in the East Residence, East Village Townhouses or West Residence – 4 to 6 bedroom apartments with kitchen (no meal plan required – students can cook their own meals which is a cheaper option).

The regular course-load for a full-time undergraduate student is 4 - 5 courses per semester (equal to 2.0-2.5 credits). Each course is usually 0.5 credits but some courses may be 0.75 credits or even 1.0 credits.

Restrictions on Disciplines

General Restrictions

Students accepted at the undergraduate level are NOT eligible to take courses at the graduate (master) level. Exchange with the Arts & Science Program is not permitted, with the exception of the ARTSSCI 4MN2 / Movement and Integration.

Faculty of Humanities

Multimedia and Studio Art courses are restricted, but may be open to students registered in a similar program at their home university (space permitting). Students interested in these courses should contact McMaster early to check availability and, if interested in Studio Art, submit a portfolio. MELD courses are not open to exchange.

Faculty of Engineering

The Bachelor of Technology program is not available to exchange students. Computer Science and Software Engineering courses are also very limited. Engineering students are permitted to register in most Level 4 courses. Engineering students wishing to take a business course must be enrolled in an Engineering Management program at their home university to be eligible.

Faculty of Social Sciences

Students applying for 'PNB' (Psychology, Neuroscience, and Behaviour) courses must have completed 'A' Level Mathematics and at least 'O' level Biology. This would equate to university Calculus and grade 12 Biology (highest biology level in high school). Students applying to the psychology program must provide copies of A and O Levels.

We can also accept the Duolingo English Test as a measure of English language proficiency. The Duolingo English Test has been designed for maximum accessibility; it is delivered via the internet, without a testing center, and is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. It is a computer-adaptive test (CAT), and it uses item types that provide maximal information about English language proficiency. To qualify, applicants must achieve a minimum score of 120 on the DET. Any older format Duolingo test, which is any Duolingo test that predates July 15, 2019, will not be considered.

Biology, Graduate level: Courses at the graduate level in Biology (5000, 6000) are not open to exchange students. Students take courses as part of research projects at York and therefore, students not attached to a research project are not eligible to enroll in the courses. Therefore, exchange applicants interested in Biology at the graduate level should already be involved in a research project at their home university and should submit an application including a summary of a research project. Undertaking this type of program while on exchange requires an appointed supervisor; therefore, York International will submit the summary to the appropriate representative in the Program for review and recommendation. Exchange applicants

who have made independent contact with the department and already have a designated supervisor, should submit a letter of invitation from the York professor with his/her exchange application. Acceptance of the proposal is not guaranteed, but reviewed on a case by case basis and depends on availability of York professors willing and able to act as supervisors.

Engineering: Applications are reviewed by the academic program.

Human Resources Management, Graduate level: Students from partner universities without a specifically signed departmental agreement will not be able to pursue courses in this program.

• **Political Science, Graduate level:** Demand for space in the graduate political science is high and therefore, spaces are limited. Exchange students must exceed minimum requirements for entry into the program.

Academic Notes

Applicants must be in a graduate program at a recognized university, normally with at least a B (second class) standing, or with qualifications accepted as equivalent. Courses or academic work taken on exchange at York, must apply to a degree at the student's home institution, and cannot be used as degree exclusions, should the student ever decide to study as a degree student at York. Graduate programs at York University may have limited space availability for exchange students. Students must have completed a minimum of 3 years of undergraduate study in order to apply. We will work closely with partners, students and programs at York to find places for qualified applications received by the deadline.

Exchange Graduate Students applications are assessed and approved by the department/faculty. Course registration is assisted by the department.
